What does natural gas smell like?

Natural gas is colorless and odorless so we've added a harmless chemical called mercaptan to make it easy to identify. This chemical has a strong distinctive odor that will alert you to a leak.

Rub the flame below with your finger to find out what natural gas smells like.



Rub & Sniff
(rub with finger, don't scratch)

Other ways to identify a gas leak:

Sight: Leaking natural gas may appear as a white cloud, mist or fog.

Sound: Leaking natural gas may make a hissing or whistling sound.

If you suspect a leak:

- **Do not** operate electrical switches or appliances.
- **Leave** the building or areas and move to a safe environment.
- **Call us** immediately: 1-855-327-7758 and dial 911.
- **Let us know** if there is construction going on in your area.

Natural gas is the most popular home heating fuel in America and is supplied by a pipeline distribution system that is among the safest, most reliable and secure methods of transporting energy.

We work diligently to ensure pipeline safety through a variety of measures including design and construction practices, inspection, monitoring, testing, notification systems, workforce training and public education programs.

Like all forms of energy, natural gas must be handled properly. Damage to a pipeline due to excavation activities may cause a gas leak and has the potential to ignite. At least 3 days before beginning any excavation activity, have all underground utilities marked by calling the national **Call Before You Dig** center at **811**. It's the law, it's free and it's for your safety.
